Custody of Children

On rare occasions, we are faced with difficult situations in which non-custodial parents arrive at school. We are best able to serve and protect students when we are made aware of legal custody arrangements and visitation rights. If legal custody matters affect your family, please ensure the office is aware.

The Rosary Apostolate

The Rosary Apostolate is a volunteer organization who pray the Rosary with children in Catholic Schools. Its formation was inspired by St. John Paul II when he launched a three-year preparation program for the Jubilee Year 2000. The Rosary Apostolate is supported by our local parish, the Diocese and Dufferin-Peel Catholic District School Board

St. James has had the privilege of hosting Rosary Visitors in our classrooms for many years. All volunteers undergo a 10-step screening process as mandated by the province for volunteer organizations that include a Vulnerable Sector Check prior to visiting classrooms. The classroom teacher remains in the classroom and prays the rosary along with the students. Rosary visitors visit our school once a month for a total of eight visits, concluding with our May Celebration. Duration of class visits differ (15-40 minutes) depending on the grades.

We look forward to continuing our relationship with our Rosary Visitors this school year and their first school visit on October 9th.

Attendance & Punctuality

Help Your Child Succeed in School: **Build the Habit of Good Attendance Early** School success goes hand in hand with good attendance!

Showing up on time every day is important to your child's success and learning from preschool forward. Missing 10% of school (1-2 days every few weeks) can:

- · Make it harder to develop early reading skills
- · Make it harder to develop numeracy skills
- · Develop a poor attendance pattern that's hard to break
- · Absences can affect the whole class as time may be required to help children catch up
- · Attending school regularly helps children feel better about school and themselves

WHAT YOU CAN DO

- · Set a regular bedtime and morning routine
- · Lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before
- · Don't let your child stay home unless he/she is truly sick. Keep in mind complaints of a stomach ache or headache can be a sign of anxiety.
- · If your child seems anxious about going to school, talk to teachers, counselors or the principal
- · Schedule appointments and extended trips when school is not in session

Visitors

Parents/visitors are reminded that they are not permitted entry to classrooms and are not to accompany their child down the hallway. Please report to the office. School personnel will assist with the entry of late students as well as the early release of students for appointments. All students leaving the school during the school day will only be released through the front office and we ask that parents please wait at the front door to receive their child safely.

Sign In/Out

The office will be handling the signing in and signing out of students. If you need to pick up your child during the school day, please notify the classroom teacher or office in writing or through the safe arrival/school messenger system. Once you arrive, please ring the doorbell and we will arrange to have your child brought to you at the front door. If a student is leaving the school independently during the day, we must have a written note to release them, phone permission will not be accepted.

If by chance students are late, we ask that they stop outside the office door and report themselves present. This is an important part of our safe entry process. When a child is alerted to the office as absent, the secretary cross-references to students who have checked in late before sending out the safe arrival callout.

Attendance Reporting

Please use the School Messenger - Safe Arrival reporting system to inform the school of late, early dismissal or absent students. This is the preferred method of reporting. We must hear from a PARENT or AUTHORIZED GUARDIAN.

Parents In The Yard

For your child's safety we request that he/she not be on school property until supervision begins at 8:45 a.m. Please do not drop your child off at the school prior to 8:45 a.m.

If not using the Kiss and Ride at dismissal, parents are reminded to refrain from approaching the school building or class lines and allow your child to come to you.

School Front Door Access

Parents/guardians:

- · Arrive at school on time to allow children to enter with their classmates to avoid front entry lates. Our bell time is 9:00 a.m.
- · If your child arrives late, you will not be allowed to accompany them to class
- · Once the front door has been opened please direct your child to come to the office right away for signing in purposes. The office will take care of signing in your child and directing them to their class.
- · Out of respect and to limit interruptions, access will not be granted once the National Anthem and daily prayer has begun. The door will once again be opened upon their conclusion.
- · Please be patient as there are times when staff are away from the desk attending other duties.

Thank you for your understanding and cooperation as we continue to implement the access protocol.

Kiss & Ride

The safety of our students and parents is of great concern to us here at the school. Please drive **SLOWLY** through the Kiss and Ride lane as well as the drive through lane. Please wait to pick up your child in the four designated spots. Please do not block the Kiss and Ride zone and areas that would hinder the movement of cars. Cars cannot be left in the lanes at any time.

Dress Code

To ensure that children are properly attired for all weather conditions, we ask parents to monitor what their children wear to school. Children are expected to participate in DPA/PE activities and are reminded to dress for the weather. It is our expectation that a standard of neatness, modesty and good taste in dress is upheld. Inappropriate, suggestive or offensive slogans on any type of clothing are not acceptable.

Change of Clothes/Shoes

Children are expected to participate in Daily Physical Activity/Physical Education activities and are reminded to dress for the weather. It is recommended the children of all grades have a change of clothing at school in the event that they get wet.

Students are asked to ensure that they have a pair of indoor shoes at school. We ask that children change their footwear when they come inside in an effort to keep our classroom floors clean.

Gym Attire

It is important for students to have appropriate gym attire on their gym days. Running shoes, shorts, sweatpants, warm-up pants, t-shirts, or a hooded sweatshirt are necessary to participate in gym. The GF401 Health & Physical Education Element of Risk form must be signed and returned prior to student participation in Physical Education.

Head Injuries

The school continues to follow the school board's head incident procedure. Please be aware you will receive a call from the school informing you of <u>ANY</u> incident involving your child's head. If we do not speak to you directly, a message will be left for you advising of the incident. In the case of a <u>more serious incident you will be asked to call the school back and we will continue to try to reach you.</u>

Medication

On occasion, the school is asked to store and/or give medication to students. <u>Medication of any kind</u> cannot be stored on school property without the proper medical forms on file.

- 1. A completed form must accompany each request for medication to be stored by the school. It is the prerogative of the Principal to decide whether or not medication will be stored or given out and may establish such conditions as are deemed necessary regarding any specific request.
- 2. School personnel will not assume responsibility for the administration of any medication.
- 3. It is the responsibility of the parent/guardian to monitor the quantity of medication stored by the school
- 4. Please let the office know if you require Storage of Medication Forms so they can be forwarded to you.

Asthma Awareness

We would like to inform you that St. James continues to participate in "We Share the Air", a Scent Sensitivity Awareness Campaign. There are students in attendance who suffer from life-threatening asthmatic conditions to air pollutants. Exposure even to minimal odours may cause potential life-threatening reactions.

Very common severe chemical triggers are; perfume, scented products and personal care products (such as hairspray). These products may cause severe reactions for students. The safety and well-being of all the students is a priority.

In order to ensure the safety and well-being of all students, we request that our school community refrain from wearing scented products complying with our Scent Free Zone Campaign at school and all school events. Please ensure that all caregivers are also aware of our awareness campaign.

If you have any questions, please talk to your child's teacher or the school staff.

Anaphylaxis Awareness

As we begin a new school year, we would like to inform you that St. James Catholic Global Learning Centre is an allergen aware school. There are pupils in attendance who suffer from severe and life-threatening allergies to certain foods, such as dairy, peanut and nut products. Exposure to the smallest quantities can cause severe life-threatening reactions.

Anaphylaxis is a severe and life-threatening allergic reaction. The most common allergen triggers are food, insect stings, medications, exercise and latex. An anaphylactic reaction involves symptoms from two or more body systems. The safety and the well-being of all of our students is a priority.

In order to ensure the safety and well-being of all pupils, we request that you **NOT** send any lunches or snacks that contain peanuts and/or tree nuts, including peanut butter substitute products. Please make sure that all of your children's caregivers are aware of the food restrictions. Please avoid sending food for birthdays or special occasions. Should there be additional allergy concerns in specific classrooms; the classroom teacher will share information

Student Accident Insurance

Birthday Snack/Treats/Non-Edible Gifts

We are asking that all parents please refrain from sending in edible snacks/treats as well as any non-edible gifts to the classrooms. We thank you for your cooperation.

Our school only offers School Cash Online as a method of payment.

School Cash Online provides the ability to pay school-related fees safely, quickly and easily. By using School Cash Online, you can help increase efficiency and security at our school by making payments directly into our school bank account. Parent registration is a simple process. Once you have registered, you will receive email notification of fees or items for payment related to activities for your child(ren). In addition, a receipt for payment will be issued to you directly and a history of payments are available at all times.

Lunch

Your child will need to bring a full lunch, personal water bottle and snacks every day. There will be no pizza lunch program for September. Food delivery services such as Uber Eats and Skip the Dishes will not be permitted. Water fountains are also available but we recommend the use of water bottles. We also have two water filling stations.

If your child forgets his/her lunch, school staff will contact you to provide a lunch. Students will only be allowed to leave school property at lunch if they have a written note from a parent/guardian.

Please complete the lunch arrangements section on the back of the student verification form coming home on September 3rd, 2024.

Phone permission will not be accepted.

Personal Electronic Devices on Board Premises and/or Board Sanctioned Events for Educational Purposes

The Dufferin-Peel Catholic District School Board acknowledges the value of the use of technology for learning. Students are permitted to register and use personal electronic devices (PEDs) on board premises and/or board sanctioned events for educational purposes, under the direction of staff and only with parent/guardian permission (GF 066-Network User Application and Agreement, completed at initial registration). Students may register their PED for the purpose of connecting to the board wireless network. Students are required to adhere to the student "Personal Electronic Device Used with WI-FI Network Student Agreement" and the "Network User Application and Agreement." The student agreement GF 337 will need to be signed before students can use the Wi-Fi network.

Please be advised that the Dufferin-Peel Catholic District School Board will not be responsible for any cost incurred through the use of personal data plans.

PEDs are to be used responsibly and should not interfere with learning; their use must comply with the Catholic Code of Conduct, board policies and procedures. Any personal communications (i.e., phone calls, text messages, etc.) are to continue to be directed through the main office. Failure to comply with these guidelines may result in a loss of PED privileges and/or any other consequences deemed necessary by school administration.

The school principal may authorize limited acceptable uses of personal electronic devices during school-sanctioned activities for a specific designated purpose outside of instructional spaces and/or in common areas.

Students are responsible for the safety and security of PEDs at all times and the Board assumes no responsibility for lost, damaged or stolen devices.

School Agenda

Organizational skills are key to student success. To assist, school agendas are provided for students in Grades 1-7. Students in grade 7 & 8 have access to Google classroom via board provided Edwin Chromebooks that have agenda features; please connect with your child's teacher if you believe a paper agenda is required for your grade 8 student. Teachers will be reviewing the importance of using an organizational tool with students. Students are responsible for recording their homework, upcoming projects/assignments, important dates and teacher notices. We encourage parents to check agendas daily and our MYP parents to have students take you on a tour of the Google Classroom platform.

Evaluation & Reporting

There will be two report cards this year, one in February and one at the end of June. There will also be one progress report sent home to parents in November. Student achievement will be shared with parents on a regular and continuing basis, through telephone conversations, notes and assigned student work. If you have questions or concerns at any time during the school year, please do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher.

Dogs on School Property

Please be aware that dogs should not be brought onto school property. We have students with severe allergies. If your dog is escorting you and your child to and from school please make arrangements to meet your child on the sidewalk in front of the school.

Special thank you to Mr. Black for picking up after the many dogs who are let loose in our schoolyard after hours.

Over the course of the school year, our youngest learners will engage in fun learning experiences that develop and strengthen the attributes of the IB Learner Profile (more on this below!). Primary Years Programme: Quick Facts

As we begin a new year, it can be helpful to review the foundational practices and concepts upon which our Primary Years Programme is built. If you are new to our community, the following information provides a glimpse of what you can expect in your child's classroom, as the new school year begins.

Here are some of the distinguishing features of the Primary Years Programme (PYP):

- ➤ As an IB World School, St. James offers an inquiry-based, concept-driven model of learning, through the PYP.
- Ontario Curriculum subjects are organized under Transdisciplinary Themes taught throughout the school year. These themes appear in grades K - 5.
- The programme helps students strengthen attributes associated with the Learner Profile. Our programme encourages students to develop these traits as they develop greater agency. See more information, below!
- > Students learn the importance of being internationally-minded.
- > Students learn to view themselves as active citizens, capable of taking meaningful action.

Launching the First Unit of Inquiry

This September, your child will begin their first unit of inquiry in their classroom. There are many different ways to begin a unit of inquiry; here are a few pathways our PYP teachers have taken that align with our IB philosophy of exploration and concept-driven learning.

Beginning with an interesting provocation.

Teachers may propose a question, problem, or real-life situation connected to the unit's central idea. This encourages students to think deeply, make connections and discuss their wonderings.

Accessing prior knowledge

Students are invited to share what they already know about a subject or topic. This is an excellent way to empower students right from the onset of the unit and get them connected to the central idea.

Inquiry / Entry Tickets

Your child may bring home an introductory activity or reflection to get them thinking about their new unit of exploration. This is a great way to make school-home connections and share in your child's learning!

(MYP) The Middle Years Programme

September Feature: IB and MYP – What's it all about?

What is an IB Education?

IB programmes are a continuum of learning from K-12 beginning with the Primary Years Programme filled by the Middle Years Programme and concluding with the Diploma Programme in secondary school. The programmes can run independently or consecutively as they share common goals and values such as developing lifelong learners.

IB programmes aim to provide an education that enables students to make sense of the complexities of the world around them, as well as equipping them with the skills and dispositions needed for taking responsible action for the future. They provide an education that crosses disciplinary, cultural, national and geographical boundaries, and that champions critical engagement, stimulating ideas and meaningful relationships.

The MYP is the second phase on the IB continuum. The programme mirrors the IB-PYP in many regards, while developing its own unique programme qualities.

Students continue to learn about themselves through the lens of the *Learner Profile Attributes*, the heart of the IB, which run through all levels of the IB organization. Students reflect on strengths, areas of challenge, and set goals for further growth in each of these 10 attributes.



The MYP also focuses on deepening self-reflection through the introduction of the *Approaches to Learning (ATL's)*. These are classified into five main categories, and further divided into 144 specific indicators. Teachers and students will select appropriate ATL's to focus on for individual units of study and lessons.



Structurally, the MYP is an extension to the PYP, moving from six Transdisciplinary Themes taught by one homeroom teacher, to specialized teachers where subjects and units are taught under the umbrella of a Global Context.



More similarly to the PYP, is the interplay of an Inquiry Based Learning Cycle: where questioning, independent learning, collaborative approaches, action, transfer skills (subject and experience based), self-selection of presentation methods, focus on learning process rather than solely an end result, are all of equal importance.



The MYP is a rigorous progamme that challenges students and promotes accountability of the individual. Students can expect to participate in a full rotary program being in each classroom for 40 or 80 minutes of their day, with FSL continuing at 40 minutes per day. Portfolio development will continue and Year 3 (Grade 8) students will complete the mandatory in-depth Community Project, beginning in October. More information on each of these to follow. We anticipate a highly successful IB - MYP school year!
