Ephesians 4:32: "Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God has forgiven you."


Ash Wednesday

International Baccalaureate Review

Schools authorized to teach International Baccalaureate programmes undergo a reflective process every five years. Programme evaluation is a key milestone in an IB programme's continuous improvement cycle. St. James CGLC is currently in a review year cycle. Staff have reviewed, updated and confirmed that all programme documentation and requirements are in place. Assessment of our implementation of the IB programme standards & practices is in progress. As parents offer a critical perspective on the school's communication, resources and implementation of the programmes, parents were invited to complete a short survey. We thank all parents who completed the survey sent out on February 26, 2025. If you have not yet had an opportunity to complete it, we hope you will take a few minutes before it closes on March 7th. An evaluation on-site visit from an IB evaluation team is scheduled for late April. The evaluation team engages the school in reflective conversations about the school's development of each IB standard and suggests areas of future programme development.





Academic Integrity Policy

As outlined in the Learner Profile Attributes, IB students are encouraged to be principled by acting with integrity and honesty, with a strong sense of fairness and justice, and with respect for the dignity and rights of people. Academic integrity is part of the teaching and learning process. Every IB World School is expected to have an academic integrity policy. This school-wide endeavour is more than a list of rules and penalties but rather a commitment to maintain an ethical culture. St James CGLC embeds academic integrity not only within our IB Learner Profile attributes and Approaches to Learning (ATL) but also within our Catholic Graduate Expectations.

From a young age, IB students are expected to be able to distinguish between what is right and what is wrong. In the context of academic integrity, one of the most important attributes is to be "principled" and all students participating in IB programmes are expected to act honestly, responsibly and ethically.

Why do we need academic integrity?

An understanding of academic integrity is fundamental in developing responsible & caring world citizens of the future. The International Baccalaureate states the key educational reasons for a strong line on academic integrity are:

- to maintain fairness all assessments need to provide an accurate reflection of a student's achievement.
- to maintain trust & credibility assessments can only be trusted & recognized if they are a true and genuine reflection of a student's level of achievement
- to develop respect for others it is acceptable to use the ideas, words or work of others; however these MUST be acknowledged

How can teachers support students:

- Academic Integrity Policy reviewed with students, including consequences
- Teaching time & lessons focused on referencing & bibliography format
- Consistent format for citing & bibliography across all MYP subjects

How can parents support students:

- Understand IB policies, procedures and guidelines in the completion of coursework & assessment by their children
- Support their children in managing workload and time management
- Support your children's independence by abstaining from giving undue assistance in the completion of their work
- Submit only genuine request for adverse circumstance considerations for their children

How students can avoid committing plagiarism:

- Read and understand the Academic Integrity Policy
- Maintain organized notes & sources during work periods & research
- Seek guidance when doubts arise about referencing
- Make sure that any information/material from others that is copied, paraphrased, adapted is acknowledged; giving credit for any words, ideas, images, maps, charts, musical compositions, films, etc.
- Information used is acknowledged in the body of the text using citation format and fully listed in the bibliography

Academic Integrity Policy (March 2023)

Recent technical advancements in Artificial Intelligence (AI) tools have sparked a need to review our policies and teaching to include learning how to correctly reference and ethically use information, opinions and AI tools.

IB students are encouraged to be effective communicators by expressing themselves confidently and creatively and principled in the choices they make. It is their responsibility to be academically honest in all aspects of their school work so that the marks they

receive are a true reflection of their own achievement. Academic dishonesty is a serious offence.

Students are supported with understanding academic integrity through teaching-learning activities that focus on prevention of academic misconduct incidents. The IB defines academic misconduct as deliberate or inadvertent behaviour that results in a student gaining an unfair advantage or disadvantaging another student. Depending on the circumstance, an appropriate consequence will be assigned which may include, but is not limited to:

- Redoing the assignment
- Redoing a section of the assignment
- Completing an alternative assignment
- Assigning a zero

Ultimately, 'the purpose of education is not only the attainment of high grades, but to acquire knowledge and develop skills for the future. The IB's mission statement is clear about the active role students have in their own learning. They are not just recipients of content, but are also expected to demonstrate authentic and genuine work that is a true reflection of their personal level of achievement.' (IB Academic Integrity Policy, March 2023)

Lent

Lent is traditionally described as lasting for 40 days, in commemoration of the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the desert during which he endured temptation by Satan.

In Lent, many Christians commit to fasting, as well as giving up certain luxuries in order to replicate the account of the sacrifice of Jesus Christ's journey into the desert; this is known as one's Lenten sacrifice. Many Christians also add a Lenten spiritual discipline, such as reading a daily devotional, to draw themselves nearer to God. The Stations of the Cross, a devotional commemoration of Christ's carrying the Cross and of his crucifixion, are often observed. Many Roman Catholic churches remove flowers from their altars. while crucifixes, religious statues, and other elaborate religious symbols are veiled in violet fabrics in solemn observance of the event. Throughout Christendom, some adherents mark the season with the traditional abstention from the consumption of meat.


(PYP) The Primary Years Programme

Applause for Student-led Conferences!

A big thank you to everyone for supporting our student-led conferences! Each year, this experience provides our students with the opportunity to exercise their voice, as they reflect on their growth throughout Term 1.

Applause to our PYP teachers, who thoughtfully planned activities that empowered students to lead conversation and reflect on the IB Learner Profile. Regular reflection is an integral part of the IB philosophy, and practices like student-led conferences and portfolios encourage our students to build this important life skill.









Student-led conferences provide insight into what learning *looks* like and *sounds* like in the classroom. From provocations that tap into prior knowledge and curiosity, to meaningful discussion that begin with student generated questions - student led reminds us that learning is varied and experiential.

Practice Inquiry Learning at Home:

After a glimpse into what learning is like in the classroom, parents often ask for suggestions on ways to bring inquiry based learning home. The good news is, there are many ways to do so! Check out some practical examples below:

- Ask open ended questions
 Try asking questions that prompt further questions, or may require additional research or exploration.
- Encourage the use of hands on activities Consider encouraging your child to show their thinking in a variety of ways, like through the use of a drawing or model.
- Investigate areas of interest, together
 If your child expresses new interest in a topic they
 learned about in class, take time to explore it more at
 home. This exploration might lead to nature walks, or
 trips to the local library.
- Encourage trial and error
 Challenge your child to exercise their problem solving skills in new ways. Consider activities like letting them grow a vegetable this spring, or creating a plan to organize their toys differently; then, let students try the new experience and reflect on what worked and what didn't.
- Encourage self reflection
 Ask prompting questions like, "What would you change", or "what do you want to explore next?", etc.

March Feature: Approaches to Learning

Approaches to Learning (ATL) are skills designed to enable students in the IB Middle Years Programme (MYP) to *learn how to learn*. ATL's are "a unifying thread throughout all MYP subject groups and are skills which help students manage

their own learning. They provide a foundation for success in further education and the world beyond the classroom." - ibo.org

Approaches to Learning (ATL) are divided into five skill categories:

- Social Skills
- Thinking Skills
- Self-Management Skills
- o Research Skills
- Communication Skills

These skills are taught, referenced, and developed throughout the Middle Years Programme.

The goal is to equip students with skills to:

- o Learn efficiently and effectively
- o Foster a lifetime of learning
- Become positive and caring individuals

Through unit planning, teachers identify ATL's (both general and subject-specific) that students will need to develop, through their participation in learning experiences, to meet the unit's objectives. The selected skills support both horizontal and vertical planning of ATL skill development and aim to meet the MYP requirements. Over the next several months, this MYP section of the newsletter will highlight one or two of the specific skill categories beginning with Social Skills.

Social Skills

The **Social Skills** skill cluster focuses on Collaborative Skills, which are essential for working effectively with peers and adults. The IB's Social Skills ATL encourages empathy, acceptance, collaboration, sharing responsibility, and taking responsibility for one's actions, all aimed at building friendships and positive relationships. Teachers model and refer to these skills in daily interactions, integrating them into the student portfolio. These skills also align with DPCDSB virtues: empathy and acceptance.

Additionally, students develop social skills for behavior and communication, such as using social

media appropriately, listening actively, giving and receiving feedback, and helping others succeed. These skills are interconnected in collaborative tasks, where students work together towards common goals, contributing to individual and group success. Being a contributing classroom member requires commitment and effort to grow as a learner, impacting both self and others.

"ATL skills focus on the process of learning, helping students to become confident, independent, self-managed learners for life."

School Dress Code

As per *General Administrative Procedure 2010 Dress Code Expectations for Students*, "all schools within the Dufferin-Peel Catholic District School Board (DPCDSB) shall adopt and communicate a consistent dress code."

Dress Code Guidelines stipulate, "a dress code refers to the standard of student dress which is respectful of the dignity of the human person and inclusive. In lieu of a prescriptive list, schools are to communicate guidelines that ensure students are dressed in a manner which ensures that the top of the shoulders to the mid-thigh are not exposed... The DPCDSB dress code excludes any garments with messages containing or portraying any offensive and/or inappropriate content. Members of the DPCDSB community will not be permitted to wear attire that promotes: a) hate, b) discrimination, c) illegal activity, d) profanity, e) violence, f) political language, g) threats to health and safety. h) or content that contravenes the Ontario Human Rights Code.

As outlined in the *General Administrative Procedure 2012 Catholic Code of Conduct*, student compliance with the school's dress code is mandatory."
